sinned" (Ps. 51:4) for whether we intend to or not, sin is a rejection of God's instruction to love one another – even if they are an enemy. And Christ is quite clear that those who do not love even their enemies will inherit "eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you gave me nothing to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not invite me in, I needed clothes and you did not clothe me, I was sick and in prison and you did not look after me" (Matt. 25:41-43).

It is a very difficult task that Christ has given us – love each other, even those who hate us, or we shall choose to go into the eternal fire. But before we understand the task, why would Christ even tell make mention of this threatening fire? If God is all-loving, why would there be such punishment? God is love and the source of all life. If we reject loving those made in His image, which includes our enemies, we reject His image, His self – Who is the source of all life. Those who go into the eternal fire choose it themselves by rejecting love and, therefore, life. It was Christ, after all, Who knew that Judas would betray Him. Yet, in His love He still washed the feet of His beloved friend, Judas. Jesus, our omnipotent God, could have called legions of angels down from heaven to stop Judas but instead chose to wash his feet. That is our example of how to treat even our enemy.

But even if a person is not our enemy, we must be aware that they are made in the image of God. We are called to serve our Lord present in the other in whatever situation presents itself. Perhaps we do not often encounter a homeless person whom we would readily clothe and feed, but the mundane situation of an upset coworker or neighbor might occur. In that moment, we have the opportunity to serve the Lord by seeing Him in the other and assisting that person in need by every little action. Our service of the Lord need not, and generally will not, be dramatic and largely notable. But it is precisely by every little action that we serve the Lord throughout all our days. And likely we will have moment where we fail in seeing the Lord in one another or reject helping Him. But, just as in loving a human, if our love of God persists we apologize and try again. Shortcomings are inevitable if we try by ourselves, but if we recall that we are motivated by divine love and ask for God's assistance we can serve Him in a pleasing manner, seeing Him in each and every person.

With confidence in faith and motivated by the love in our God, which governs how we treat one another, we should not fear Judgment. Instead, we should hope to hear Him say after having served Him, "Take your inheritance, the kingdom prepared for you since the creation of the world" (Matt. 25:34).



Prayers & Squares

Prayers and Squares is a prayer ministry that involves making prayer quilts and prayer squares for those facing medical, spiritual, emotional difficulties, or anyone in the Parish that is active duty military. Don't know how to quilt? That's ok, we can teach you. Not interested in sewing? That's ok, we will need help with staying organized, record keeping and correspondence. What is needed are willing hearts and hands to do God's work and pray together for those in need, and each other too.

A prayer quilt or square, once requested, is made and tied with each knot representing a prayer for that individual and their specific needs. The recipient must be willing to receive the quilt and the prayers. The purpose of the group is not to give away quilts, but to offer a physical representation of God's love and the prayers of the community. A recipient is able to wrap themselves in prayer during a difficult time. The quilt itself has no power, but the prayers offered do.

A Unique Parishioner Call for Help

Dear Friends,

Re: End-Stage Kidney Disease

Some of you may already know: I have end-stage kidney disease. My kidneys do not work well enough to keep me alive, and my treatment options are limited to dialysis or kidney transplant.

Regular hemodialysis treatments, three times per week for four hours at a time, help my kidneys do their job and keep me alive. But a transplant would offer me the ability to live a longer, healthier, more normal life and with more freedom.

Finding a kidney for a transplant is not easy. There are 100,000+ people, just like me, on the waiting list for a deceased donor kidney. Time is not on our side. Some die while waiting. I've been waiting nearly six years, about a year longer than the average wait time of five years.

There is another option: receiving a kidney from a living donor. Asking a family member or a friend to donate a kidney is very difficult for me, extremely personal, takes much thought and involves your family's consideration. Your decision will not affect our relationship, and I absolutely do not want a donor feeling pressured in any way.

You may not know a lot about living donation, which I did not until recently. Understandably, many people are fearful of surgery and what living with one kidney will mean for them. Here's some basic information about kidney donation:

• Most people are born with an extra kidney - only one is needed to live a long, healthy life.

• As a living donor, you will have a separate team of Healthcare professionals to evaluate you. Their job is to help YOU understand the risks and benefits, looking out for YOUR best interests.

• Cost of your evaluation and surgery will be covered by my insurance; the hospital can provide to you more information.

• Most donor surgery is done laparoscopically, meaning through tiny incisions.

• Recuperation is usually fairly quick, generally two weeks, for people with desk jobs, to six weeks, for jobs involving heavy lifting.

What is a paired kidney exchange? Roughly one-third of kidney failure patients with a willing living donor will be unable to receive the kidney because of incompatibility. In a paired kidney exchange, a donor may donate their kidney to another recipient in exchange for a compatible kidney for their loved one.

Before deciding, you can explore the living donation program by calling MUSC's Kelly Canavan, my Living Donor Coordinator, at <u>843-792-1594</u>.

A living donation may not be right for you, but you can still help. Please help by sharing my story, spreading the word about kidney disease, raising awareness of living donation and helping me and the many others on the waiting list.

Rather, "if your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink; for by so doing you will heap burning coals upon his head." Do not be conquered by evil but conquer evil with good.

Matt 25:31-46

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, he will sit upon his glorious throne, and all the nations will be assembled before him. And he will separate them one from another, as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. He will place the sheep on his right and the goats on his left. Then the king will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you?' And the king will say to them in reply, 'Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me.' Then he will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you accursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me no drink, a stranger and you gave me no welcome, naked and you gave me no clothing, ill and in prison, and you did not care for me.' Then they will answer and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or ill or in prison, and not minister to your needs?' He will answer them, 'Amen, I say to you, what you did not do for one of these least ones, you did not do for me.' And these will go off to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life."


