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MASS INTENTIONS

Mass intentions are a good way to remember and pray for your loved ones, alive or deceased. If you would like to request an intention please remember to submit your intentions for Liturgy ASAP by calling the parish office at 864.469.9119 or by email at bill@saintrafka.org. Please remember that it is rare to be able to have your intention the following Sunday! Masses are now generally booked up about three months in advance.

BAPTISM & CHRISMATION

Baptism in the Maronite Rite is always accompanied by *Chrismation* (Confirmation). Both Sacraments are given by a priest, and always in the same ceremony. Preparation to receive the Sacraments of Baptism and Chrismation is required. We encourage this to happen before the birth of your child. Please contact the Church Office for more details.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

The Anointing of the Sick is routinely offered during the Divine Liturgy on Wednesday evening and during pastoral visits by the priest to homebound and ill parishioners. Let me know if you will be in the hospital or have other special needs. Contact the Church Office.

THE MYSTERY OF CROWNING (MARRIAGE)

Couples must contact the pastor **at least** six months prior to the desired date of the wedding. To initiate the marriage preparation process or if you have questions for weddings taking place at Saint Rafka. Contact the **Church Office**.

PARISH REGISTRATION

Registration forms and welcome packets are available in the church office and the vestibule. Membership is a condition for the reception of the sacraments of baptism/confirmation, first reconciliation, first Eucharist, and Crowning (marriage). Registration is also required before the parish can issue a sponsorship certificate for those asked to be sacramental sponsors. You must be a registered, contributing member for at least three months before a certificate is provided.

Scripture Readings

2 Kings 5:1-14

Naaman, the army commander of the king of Aram, was highly esteemed and respected by his master, for through him the LORD had brought victory to Aram. But valiant as he was, the man was a leper. Now the Arameans had captured from the land of Israel in a raid a little girl, who became the servant of Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, "If only my master would present himself to the prophet in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy." Naaman went and told his master, "This is what the girl from the land of Israel said." The king of Aram said, "Go. I will send along a letter to the king of Israel." So Naaman set out, taking along ten silver talents, six thousand gold pieces, and ten festal garments. He brought the king of Israel the letter, which read: "With this letter I am sending my servant Naaman to you, that you may cure him of his leprosy."

When he read the letter, the king of Israel tore his garments and exclaimed: "Am I a god with power over life and death, that this man should send someone for me to cure him of leprosy? Take note! You can see he is only looking for a quarrel with me!" When Elisha, the man of God, heard that the king of Israel had torn his garments, he sent word to the king: "Why have you torn your garments? Let him come to me and find out that there is a prophet in Israel." Naaman came with his horses and chariot and stopped at the door of Elisha's house. Elisha sent him the message: "Go and wash seven times in the Jordan, and your flesh will heal, and you will be clean." But Naaman went away angry, saying, "I thought that he would surely come out to me and stand there to call on the name of the LORD his God, and would move his hand over the place, and thus cure the leprous spot. Are not the rivers of Damascus, the Abana and the Pharpar, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them and be cleansed?" With this, he turned about in anger and left. But his servants came up and reasoned with him: "My father, if the prophet told you to do something extraordinary, would you not do it? All the more since he told you, 'Wash, and be clean'?" So Naaman went down and plunged into the Jordan seven times, according to the word of the man of God. His flesh became again like the flesh of a little



Therefore, do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace. What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification. When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Mark1: 35-45

In the morning, while it was still very dark, Jesus got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. And Simon and his companions hunted for him. When they found him, they said to him, 'Everyone is searching for you.' He answered, 'Let us go on to the neighboring towns, so that I may proclaim the message there also; for that is what I came out to do.' And he went throughout Galilee, proclaiming the message in their synagogues and casting out demons. A leper came to him begging him, and kneeling he said to him, 'If you choose, you can make me clean.' Moved with pity, Jesus stretched out his hand and touched him, and said to him, 'I do choose. Be made clean!' Immediately the leprosy left him, and he was made clean. After sternly warning him he sent him away at once, saying to him, 'See that you say nothing to anyone; but go, show yourself to the priest, and offer for your cleansing what Moses commanded, as a testimony to them.' But he went out and began to proclaim it freely, and to spread the word, so that Jesus could no longer go into a town openly, but stayed out in the country; and people 4 came to him from every quarter.

Reflection

On this Sunday, in our Maronite prayers, Christ Our Lord is called the Physician of our souls and bodies. The Symbolic connection between Leprosy and Sin cannot be overlooked in our gospel readings for today. In the first reading St. Paul speaks of the grace of Christ that makes us righteous before God though we are sinners. In a parallel way, in the Gospel of Mark, Jesus heals the leper because of his great compassion towards him and makes him whole.

This timed presentation, of Jesus the Lord as our healer, in the Church's teaching during Lent is quite intentional. Combined with the *Sunday of the Prodigal Son*; the healing Sundays work together in unity to emphasize this important teaching for us from the church: that we need to be healed, and that we need to let Christ the Lord be the healer of our whole being.

In our Syriac tradition this *healing power of Christ* is presented to us by his bride, the Church, and our mother, through her sacramental mysteries. Thus, we find Saint Ephrem praying to Christ Jesus saying:

With three medicines
You have cured our sickness;
Humanity was weak, suffering and failing;
You have strengthened it
by your blessed bread,
You have consoled it with your sober wine,
And You have given it joy
with your holy anointing.

Now is the season to apply ourselves for the *help* of the healing-sacraments (*Raze*) of Christ and the Church. It is the time that we use the confessional as a means of acknowledging our sinfulness, and the Eucharist as the channel through which the graces of Christ – of healing and forgiveness – with the overflowing power of his Holy Spirit are poured out into us.



Listen again to the song from the *Qolo*:

The faith of the man
with leprosy
reached out for our savior
and he obtained the help
that he desired.
For the compassion
of the Son of God,
like rain,
poured down on him
and brought forth
a total healing.

Let us have courage then, and not hesitate, to ask for the help we need: for *the Healer* graciously awaits us!




MRE - Maronite Religious Education Classes



Lenten Regulations

Fast & Abstinence: Ash Monday and Great Friday of the Crucifixion are days of total abstinence from meat and all meat products. In addition to being days of abstinence from meat and meat by products, they are days of mandatory fast, i.e., NOTHING but water is consumed from midnight until noon. One main meal may be consumed after noon. Water and medicine do not break the fast. The law of abstinence binds all Maronite Catholics over fourteen (14) years of age. The law of fasting binds all Maronite Catholics between the age of eighteen (18) and sixty (60). Diabetics and those with health issues are excused from extreme fasting. You are encouraged to fast on all Wednesdays and Fridays of Great Lent; and as many additional days as you find appropriate.

Services for Great Lent: The Services for Great Lent will take place each weekday Tuesday thru Friday. On Tuesdays thru Fridays, the Di vine Liturgy will be celebrated. On Friday evening at 7:00 PM., Stations of the Cross will be celebrated.

The Great Lent Collective Procession

We are all called to observe Lent, following the example of Our Lord Jesus Christ who, "After fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry" (Matthew 4:2). The forty-day community journey rests on three integrated and interconnected foundations: fasting, prayer and almsgiving.

Fasting, abstaining from food from midnight until noon, as a sign of repentance, contrition and remorse for venial and mortal sins, while confessing them. It is a time of renewal for the repentant, and the beginning of a new life. Lent is a time of returning to God through the sacrament of reconciliation, instituted by Our Lord Jesus Christ, with the abundance of his love and divine mercy; it is like a new birth, erasing the old life deformed by sins. Fasting is a sacred time during which we return to God, stand in solidarity with our brothers and sisters, share Christ's fasting, life and sufferings, and resist the tempter.

Prayer is the elevation of mind and heart to God, a human response to the Word of God that nourishes our faith. It is humility of heart before the magnificence of God, and man's need for God, from whom comes all that is good. Lent is a time of prayer and renewal through divine grants. Authentic and effective prayer is that of the heart, not of the lips, for if the heart is far from God, prayer of the lips is meaningless. The heart is God's dwelling place, where our prayer becomes a relationship of covenant and communion with God.

Almsgiving means sharing with our brothers and sisters what they need from what we have, whether it is a lot or a little. Through sharing and communion, we overcome the temptation of selfishness, possessive greed and the love of money, which stand in the way of God's priority in our lives. The worship of worldly riches separates us from God and our brothers and sisters, and deceives us with illusory happiness. Almsgiving is an act of love towards those in material, moral, spiritual or social need. Christ identifies with these brothers and sisters (cf. Matthew 25:35-36).

Almsgiving can be carried out directly or through groups, charitable associations and institutions, and well-known organizations such as Caritas Lebanon, which is the social body of the Church in Lebanon and is present throughout the country. Caritas is conducting a collection campaign throughout Lent.

Pastoral guidelines

A- Great Lent and fasting during and outside Lent

- 1. **Great Lent** lasts seven weeks, in preparation for Easter. It begins on Ash Monday and ends on the evening of Holy Saturday. It is based on **abstinence from food** from midnight to midday, as well as abstinence from meat and whites (milk, its derivatives and eggs).
- 2. The Saturdays, Sundays and the following public holidays are exempt from fasting and abstinence: Saint Jean Maron (March 2), the Forty Martyrs (March 9), Saint Joseph (March 19), the Annunciation (March 25) and the Patron Saint of the parish. Throughout Holy Week, from Monday to Holy Saturday, fasting and abstinence remain mandatory.
- 3. **Exempted from fasting and abstinence** are, in general, the sick and elderly whose state of health requires them to eat adequately in order to regain their strength, in particular those undergoing medical treatment for chronic illnesses or in special, delicate health conditions.

This exemption also applies to patients undergoing temporary or regular hospitalization. It is also established that children begin fasting the year after their First Communion, while taking into account their situation during school days.

Those who are exempt from the law of fasting and abstinence are asked to make do with a breakfast sufficient to take the medicine.

In view of the necessities of life and to ease the burden on the faithful, the law of abstinence remains obligatory during the first week of Great Lent and during Holy Week, provided that those who cannot adhere to abstinence must compensate by acts of charity.

- 4. Abstinence is practiced in the Church on the occasion of three feasts, each limited to one week according to our authority. These are: the abstinence of the Holy Apostles Peter and Paul, and of the Twelve Apostles (June 21 to 28), the abstinence of the Assumption of the Virgin Mary (August 8 to 14) and the abstinence of Christmas (December 16 to 24).
- 5. **The Friday fast** lasts all year round. Fridays excluded: the Friday before the start of Great Lent, the Fridays between Easter and Pentecost, and between Christmas and Epiphany. Fridays coinciding with the following feasts are also excluded: The Circumcision of the Child Jesus (January 1), Saint Anthony the Great (January 17), The Presentation of Jesus in the Temple (February 2), Saint John Maron (March 2), The Forty Martyrs (March 9), Saint Joseph (March 19), The Annunciation (March 25), Saints Apostles Peter and Paul (June 29), Assumption of the Virgin Mary (August 15), Beheading of John the Baptist (August 29), Nativity of the Virgin Mary (September 8), Exaltation of the Cross (September 14), Immaculate Conception (December 8), Christmas (December 25), Patron Saint of the parish, Sacred Heart of Jesus.

B- Eucharistic fast

This is the abstinence from light food by priests and faithful in preparation for receiving the Most Holy Eucharist during the Divine Liturgy, at least one hour before the start of Mass. And we take this opportunity to remind you of the importance of maintaining a state of grace, decency of dress and piety, as well as invoking Christ the Lord present in the bread and wine.

Conclusion

6. Great Lent is the "favorable time" for spiritual and human merits, stemming from fasting, prayer and almsgiving, as well as repentance and reconciliation. It is a "time of grace" that leads us to the "crossing over" to new life with Christ's Passover.

We pray God, through the intercession of our Mother, the Virgin Mary, Our Lady of Lebanon, and of our father Saint Maron, to grant His grace to all the members of our Church: pastors, priests, monks, nuns and faithful, in Lebanon, in the patriarchal territory and in the countries of the diaspora. We implore stability and peace for our homelands, for the glory of the Most Holy Trinity: the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Amen.
